


# BARNSLEY CIVIC LAGING TO THE CONTROL OF THE CONTROL

70 YEARS OF YOUTH
CULTURE & TEENAGE
EXPERIENCES IN THE
ELDON STREET HERITAGE
ACTION ZONE









Over the last 18 months, Barnsley Civic has been proud to be a partner with Barnsley Council in delivering the cultural programme for the Eldon Street Heritage Action Zone project. Our contribution to the cultural programme was Teenage Wildlife.

The original concept for the Teenage Wildlife project was to have a multi-generational project that would explore what it was like to be a teenager in Barnsley over 70 years and the history of Eldon Street would be used as a starting point for those conversations. Between the 1950s and the present day, Eldon Street has been home to cinemas, theatres, dance schools, youth clubs, pubs, bars, cafes, fashion shops, salons and libraries; all venues associated with the teenage experience.

Barnsley Civic's community engagement and visual art programme already had a reputation for exhibitions and engagement exploring teen sub-cultures and their influence on fashion and pop culture, so we were incredibly excited to get our teeth into the process of collecting stories and images.

To ensure we represented a broad age range of contributors, and included marginalised communities, teenagers today and also teenagers born elsewhere, we developed a programme of targeted engagement activity, enabling us to work with different local

community and support groups. We created safe spaces for sharing more personal memories of teenage relationships, bullying, mental health, teenage pregnancy, LGBTIQ+ rights, divorce and war. Some groups worked with artists to explore more

creative outputs, including poems, textile artworks, banners and even a piece of theatre.

We have presented the stories and images donated to Teenage Wildlife in many different ways; pop-up exhibitions, performances, a magazine, postcards, a poetry pamphlet and a map.

We are proud to have seen so many people engage with local history in such a unique way and to have been entrusted with so many people's stories and memories, which will now form a permanent Teenage Wildlife youth culture archive at Barnsley Archives.




